Cymbidium Cricket 'Rosetta' Hybrid



Yellow to light brown dark brown lip flowers a good plant will have over 20 flowers per spike. The plant on display Grown by Mr. Wain has 52 spikes with more than 1200 flowers. This plant usually flower in Spring, Cool grower, shade house or outside under protection.

Grown by L & A. Shepherd intermediate Grower Yellow flower. Cold grower. Indoor or under protection

Disa



Pronouncation: DYE-sa or DEE-sa. This is primarily a South African genus. Disa may have a reputation for being difficult to grow, but they thrive under cool damp conditions that mimic the environment near the streams and waterfalls of their natural habitats. They are terrestrial found growing along the sides of stream banks and other wet areas at altitudes between 100m to 1200 m. One of the most popular Disa species is Disa uniflora, the floral symbol of the Western Cape province of South Africa. Disa collections have appeared in botanical journals as early as 1704 (Gardiner & Cribb, 2018). Disa flowers may be red, pink, occasionally white or yellow.



How to grow

Disa can grow well in Melbourne as the origin of Disa is relatively similar as shown on the map above. Some growers in Melbourne successfully grow Disa and have developed new crosses. I can say one successful Disa growers in Melbourne is Gabor Szep, a member of Bayside Orchid Society and OSSV. Our club members Anna and Lawrie Christensen also able to grow Disa. In this article I would like to share Gabor's way or technique. He kindly shared his knowledge to me and I would like to share this knowledge with his permission. I have tried and succeed.

Conditions

Disa can tolerate temperatures near freezing, However protect it from the heat. They can be grown outside under the protection of shady bushes. If grown in a shade house or veranda, provide ample air movement and humidity.

Potting Mix

Sphagnum moss is ideal growing media. I observed some growers using small bark mixed with perlite, the result is not as good as using moss media. The drawback of this media is it does not last long compared to mix of bark and perlite that can last 2-3 years. Placing pebbles or clay balls on the top sphagnum moss can prolong optimum condition.

Watering

Disa require more water than most orchids. Keep wet at all times. Gabor places the pots in the Styrofoam box that he places minimum two drainage holes (located 2-2.5 cm above the base of the box). Rain water is preferable, if no rain water is available fill a container with tap water and let sit for a day. Change the water in monthly bases, or earlier when you start seeing algae changed the water colour to green.

Fertiliser

Spagnum moss media provide significant nutrient for the plant. However, Applying very weak soluble fertilisers can be used to boost the growth. It is best to under feed rather over feed.

Flowering

Flowers appear during late spring until midsummer. They flower off last year's growth which grows from a tuber. This growth will die after flowering. During the flowering time, small plants will appear and become the future flowering growths. **Re-potting**

After the flowering growth dies, gently divide the new growths. The roots are very brittle. If in sphagnum moss re pot yearly, allow several years between other mixes.

Problems

White mealy bugs and aphids can be a problem. Treat with a commercial product such as eco oil. Slugs and snails should be treated with snail bait. Drying out in hot weather as well as becoming water logged over a long period of time will also place stress on the plant.
